Bella Finds Her Forever Home

When Pet Pals started our TNR (trap-neuter-return) program nearly 20 years ago, we were determined to help the many feral cats living in our county. We had no idea that we'd end up helping just as many tame cats. That's why the program is now called "Community Cats." So many of the cats we spay and neuter are not the least bit feral. Sometimes they are simply lost and frightened.

That was definitely the case with Bella, a little black cat who was found hiding beneath the porch of Pet Pals supporter Lori Oberlander. "This little cat was hungry, thirsty and afraid," Lori said. "She hid under our porch, day and night and, when she wasn't hiding, she was running."

Lori couldn't get close enough to determine Bella's gender but she was concerned about the obviously homeless cat. "Stray cats don't live very long in our neighborhood — surrounded by wood and wild animals." Lori and her husband starting putting out food and water for the kitty and wondered what was going to happen next. If the cat was a female, was she going to show up one day with kittens? How were they going to catch a cat who ran every time she got even a glimpse of a person?

Fortunately, Lori knew about Pet Pals. She called and explained the situation to board member Donna Regester who coordinates our Community Cats efforts in Port Hadlock. Donna brought a humane trap to Lori and demonstrated its use. Donna also called ahead to

the Hadlock Veterinary Clinic to let them know that Lori would be (hopefully!) bringing them a feral cat for spay or neuter and that Pet Pals would pay for it. Everything was in place. Lori just needed to get the cat into the trap. She put the trap on the back porch where she and her

husband had been feeding the little kitty and luckily, she was hungry enough to walk into the trap the first day. Bella spent the night in a quiet corner of the garage until the veterinary clinic opened in the morning.

The little cat — only about six months old — turned out to be already spayed. Obviously she had a home at one point. And one thing was clear: Bella was not the least bit feral. Once she realized she was safe, she showed her true nature, that of a sweet and loving cat. And the best part was that she had found a forever home — with Lori and her husband. Lori says that Bella loves to sit on her lap and lick her face. "We are so grateful to Pet Pals for helping us get such a great member of our family."

've been reading this week about organizations like Wings of Rescue and Pilots N Paws, volunteer aviators who donate their time and resources to transfer unwanted rescue dogs from overcrowded shelters to those less overburdened.

I like these stories for several reasons. Of course it is always heartwarming to see people who care about animals making a difference. The number cited for pets euthanized in the U.S. every year is still a horrifying four million, but we know that has gone down more than

50% in the last 20 years. Another heartening fact is that there are many more shelters doing well enough to take in dogs (and hopefully cats) who are transported from other areas.

I firmly believe that such progress has been made as a direct result of spay and neuter programs that mirror ours. If every county in the U.S. had an Olympic Mountain Pet Pals, the euthanasia rate would be dropping far more quickly. Your understanding of this direct link between spay/neuter and the elimination of homelessness for pets keeps us going and we are ever grateful to our supporters for that.

Local efforts are the key and together we can set an example that will inspire others. My hope is that in another few years this newsletter column will celebrate the fact that all shelters can concentrate on finding forever homes for adoptable pets rather than trying to figure out how to make room for them all.

Praise for TNR Programs

et Pals supporters know that trap-neuterreturn is the most effective and humane way to control populations of feral cats. And it looks like we aren't alone in our appreciation for TNR. A national survey commissioned by Best Friends Animal Society found that Americans are overwhelmingly supportive of this approach. Among the more than 1,000 people who answered the survey, more than 68% preferred TNR to euthanizing these cats or doing nothing.

Public support means that more cats receive help. In fact, programs supported by Best Friends and PetSmart Charities have found that 80% of cats who are helped through community TNR programs are found because of calls from concerned citizens as well as neighborhood canvassing efforts.

Meet Tonzo, a READ to ROVER Dog with an Illustrious Past

B efore becoming a READ to ROVER dog, Tonzo worked as a sled dog in Denali National Park. Larry Montague was in college, working a summer job in Denali, when he met Tonzo and fell in love with him. When not leading field courses for Alaska Geographic, Larry found a volunteer opportunity to exercise the sled dogs at the Denali kennels. He would walk Tonzo every chance he got. At that time, Tonzo was 9 years old (the usual retirement age for working sled dogs) and had logged 8760 miles, patrolling the park with rangers in the winter. He was a "wheel dog" which meant that he was placed right in front of the sled and responsible for pulling much of its weight. Tonzo was big and powerful, but it was his gentle and loving nature that attracted Larry.

The sled dogs in Denali are not racing dogs, but instead are traditional freight dogs, enabling rangers to patrol for poachers and transporting researchers and supplies into the interior of the park in the winter. Along the trail, sled dog teams may encounter wolves, caribou, moose, and hungry bears waking up in the spring. In the summer, the kennels become a tourist attraction, with the dogs on display and petted by hundreds of visitors - good experience for a future READ to ROVER dog. The dogs also do pulling demonstrations for the tourists using a sled on wheels.

At the end of that summer, Larry was informed that Tonzo would indeed be retired and he was encouraged to adopt Tonzo. This proved to be irresistable, in spite of logistical problems with transportation and housing at his upstate NY college. Upon moving to Port Townsend after graduation, Larry and Tonzo were certified as an OMPP therapy dog team.
