Pet Pals is Working with the Public Libraries to offer Virtual Summer Read to Rover Sessions

There is no substitute for the hands-on experience of reading with one hand in the fur of a friendly dog. However, with everyone trying to stay safe at home, even therapy dogs have to innovate and adapt.

The Read to Rover program is working with Scott Bahlmann, youth librarian at Jefferson County Library, and Hilary Verheggen, youth librarian at Port Townsend Library, to create a children's reading program for the summer using Zoom sessions. Read to Rover teams will be standing by to read with kids on Thursday mornings, June 25 though July 30, between 10:30 and 11:30 am.

What Exactly Is a Community Cat?

While you may have heard that Pet Pals has a program to spay or neuter

Community Cats, it may be helpful for us to explain exactly what that means. "Community Cat" is the catch-all term that the animal welfare community uses for those feral and stray cats living outdoors, i.e. free-roaming in our communities.



These cats are generally considered to be unowned and may or may not have a caregiver. Adult cats may be tame, abandoned or lost pets; but any kittens, if born outside without human contact for the first 8 weeks of their lives, may end up feral.

Our Community Cat Program's mission is to help Jefferson County residents improve the lives of these unowned cats that show up on their property. If a new cat proves to be tame, it can be taken to the Humane Society of Jefferson County, where it will be spay/neutered and adopted out as a pet. If the new cat seems to be feral, a trap is needed to get it spay/neutered at a local vet clinic. The Community Cat Program has helped with the spay/neuter of 2377 cats since it started in 2001.
