The trailer is located at the animal shelter and is now being used to provide medical care to shelter pets. In addition, HSJC has begun using the facility to offer spay/neuter, vaccination and microchip clinics for lower-income County residents. We are excited to welcome this great new community resource.

Center Valley Animal Rescue (CVAR) continues to provide two or three spay/neuter clinics per month in their onsite surgical unit.
