We are Grateful to our Volunteers and Supporters

Thank you to all our donors for coming through for us with end-of-year donations! After we reported a 44% drop in year-to-date donations in our November 2022 eNews, you stepped up at the end of the year with a 65% increase over the same holiday period the previous year. This puts us in a much better position to meet the challenges of providing financial assistance at our partners' spay and neuter clinics to serve the needs of low income Jefferson County families in 2023.

We also love our volunteers who contribute their time and energy to make our programs so successful. There are 16 active dog/handler teams at Chimacum Creek Primary School READ to ROVER, plus 5 human volunteers (without dogs of their own) who help in countless ways and 3 very busy substitute dog/handler teams. At Salish Coast Elementary School READ to ROVER in Port Townsend, there are 15 dog/handler teams and 2 human helpers that do essential tasks. The Pets to People Program has attracted 12 dog/handler teams to visit with seniors.
