This allows the students to be educated to the maximum extent possible with their grade level peers while accommodating their unique learning needs.

This is a wonderful opportunity for students, volunteers and dogs. The students have the opportunity to improve their reading skills while learning ways to interact with dogs. The volunteers have a chance to contribute to the success of students with special needs. The dogs get another chance for treats. Abbey is especially appreciative of

This summer, we had our 1½ year old female, Dipper, spayed at a local veterinary clinic. The veterinary staff were skilled, caring, and professional. The surgery and recovery went well, although Dipper had her own opinions about the restrictions on play and wearing the cone during the healing process. We are looking forward to no more three week disruptions in Dipper's activity schedule because of heat cycles. Overall, a positive experience.

I was prepared, so did not experience sticker shock, when I got the bill. One thing even the vets will agree upon is that no one can use the word "affordable" for this procedure at private clinics. Many pet-loving families in our community would

see the expense as a big hit to their budget. How many spays and neuters are being deferred because of other financial priorities in today's economy? Like other examples of deferred maintenance on home, health, or vehicles, unwanted surprises can result. My own experience seeing the cost of a spay operation illustrates the point dramatically for me. That is why Olympic Mountain Pet Pals continues to search for more ways to increase the availability of low-cost spay/neuter clinics to serve our community and to ensure we have the funding to support them adequately. It's an onging challenge that we can not step away from. Please help us if you can!

Our other recent first-hand experience involves the incredible **joy** of starting a new year of READ to ROVER in the schools with a new crop of second grade readers meeting their dogs. It's hard to convey the excitement of the kids, the dogs, the volunteers, and the school staff when we arrive each week to share the fun of reading a good story. The dedicated volunteers who have been with the program for awhile

sense the potential in these beginning readers since we've seen struggling readers in October become accomplished chapter book readers by June. I'm not claiming it's all because of our dogs, but being even a small part of these students' growth is very gratifying and the dogs do make the journey much more fun. Finally, I return to asking for your help to ensure more Jefferson County cats and dogs can live healthier lives regardless of their family's economic status and to address the critical goal of reducing the number of unwanted and homeless animals in our community.

## Making a Difference through Spay / Neuter

The late Dr. Jane Goodall, the eminent scientist who studied Chimpanzees and made startling discoveries about their lives, has said she learned how to live with kindness as a creed from her dog Rusty. Even before she went into the forests of Gombe, she had learned a deep lesson from her dog that animals think, feel and love unconditionally and that they are clever, individual and full of personality.

A story by Julie Castle of Best Friends Animal Sanctuary honors Dr. Goodall and her connection to animals. She quotes Dr. Goodall - "What you do makes a difference, and you have to decide what kind of difference you want to make."

At Olympic Mountain Pet Pals we continue to commit to making a difference for the animals in our

community through our support of spay/neuter programs. In this way, we help control the pet homelessness crisis and ensure the medical and behavioral benefits that come with spaying or neutering pets.

I've written before about the scarcity of resources available for non-profits in our community to support spay/neuter clinics. We are currently continuing to work with partners and there is a collaboration in the works with the Humane Society of Jefferson County to plan a series of

the works with the Humane Society of Jefferson County to plan a series of larger-volume spay/neuter clinics for lower income residents starting in 2026. Our part in this effort will be to financially support clinics and provide volunteers to help things run smoothly. We are talking with local vets and spay/neuter advocates to make this happen.

All animals deserve to live their best lives. They should not suffer or be abandoned because they simply are not enough homes for all. We know as well that paying for spay/neuter surgery and other veterinary services is out of reach for many households. The need is great and, with your help, we are committed to supporting partnerships that will result in a new and effective way to provide this essential service for pets and pet owners in our community.

# A Tribute to Stanley Roger, a special READ to ROVER Dog

e were in Stanley, Idaho for the 2017 total eclipse when we learned we could adopt a puppy on our way home. Stanley was one of three male pups in a litter of ten golden doodles. He grew into a lovable handsome gent.

Stanley was five years old in 2022 when READ to ROVER came into his life. He was not the best trained dog, but he made up for it by being a gentle giant that Georgia Towle recognized and he passed his therapy dog test.

Coming to Salish Coast Elementary School every Wednesday morning, he welcomed four second graders who spent 20 minutes each reading with him. When the kids came into the library, there was some competition to find their favorite dog. Most kids loved to be with Stanley. I used to tell people he was like a little horse, weighing in at 115 pounds. It was so special when the kids would cuddle up on the floor with him, Stanley wearing his red READ to ROVER scarf. When the 2-minute bell rang, signaling the end of our time together, his reading partners gently handed him a yummy treat, got stickers and a "Reading to Stanley Roger" bookmark.

It was a joy to see our young readers progress over the year from not being

ready to read out loud, to sounding out words, and then advancing to more complex books. Two second grade readers were notable - one expressed their interest in fantasy books that also include historical fiction. Another one commented, "I'm not like most kids, I like biographies." I loved seeing a student who held up two books asking Stanley which book he would like to hear first. Kudos to their teachers who made it a priority for their students to participate in R2R weekly.


I was very touched to know that READ to ROVER started in 2004. During the past year, a

young man who was helping me with yardwork, and another who is a staff member in my doctor's office, both met Stanley. When I mentioned his READ

I love it when I recognize R2R readers around town and realize that I will have the pleasure of seeing them grow up in our community long after meeting during our special times together at Salish Coast.

Stanley Roger ended his partner teaching career at the end of this past school year when he died of leukemia. While very sad, I am so glad that Stanley Roger was able to bring joy to so many children through READ to ROVER.

I want to acknowledge and thank Olympic Mountain Pet Pals and the READ to ROVER Program, the leadership of Donna Geer and Karin Nyrop for keeping our Salish Coast teams of dogs organized, and especially all the volunteer dogs and their fun owners. Are you considering becoming an OMPP Therapy Dog team with your dog and joining programs such as READ to ROVER? Here's what you need to know:

We hold therapy dog tests once a month (first Saturday at noon) at Lucky Dog Training Center in Chimacum. For more information and to get on the schedule for a test, please contact Georgia Towle at (360) 732-0908, theluckydogtraining@gmail.com.

The skills you and your dog need to demonstrate include being able to approach and greet a friendly stranger without jumping up on them, sitting politetly for petting, sitting quietly in proximity to other dogs, walking on a loose leash, sitting, lying down, staying, and coming when called, walking past another dog/handler team without aggression and under control, leaving a pile of toys or food on the ground from a distance of several feet, milling around in a crowd of people and dogs, responding well to visual and noise distractions, and waiting at a doorway until the handler crosses the threshold. No treats are allowed during the test.

## Need to Fill Holiday Treat Bags for Pets? Kim's Famous Liver Cake

### **Ingredients**

- 1 box Jiffy Corn Muffin Mix
- 1 egg
- 1 lb liver (chicken or beef)
- 1 cup grated cheese (your choice)

### **Instructions**

- 1. Preheat oven to 400 F.
- 2. Grease 9 x11 inch cookie sheet with raised edges.
- 3. Mix together corn mix, egg, and liver in food processor until batter is thick.
- 4. Pour batter into cookie sheet.
- 5. Sprinkle with cheese.
- 6. Bake 15 minutes.

Can keep in refrigerator for 4-5 days or freeze for later.
